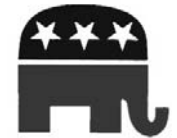

### Judges

"With one more vacancy on the Supreme Court, we could be looking at a majority hostile to a woman's fundamental right to choose for the first time since Roe v. Wade. The next president may be asked to nominate that Supreme Court justice. That is what is at stake in this election."

Pledged to appoint judges like John Roberts and the late William Rehnquist. Believes that the moral authority of our judiciary depends on judicial self-restraint. He believes judges should strictly interpret the law, and not legislate.

### Gay Marriage

#### Supports

- Supports full civil unions that give same-sex couples equal legal rights and privileges as married couples.
- Voted against the Federal Marriage Amendment, which would have defined marriage as between a man and a woman.

#### Opposes

- Believes that marriage must be protected as a sacred institution of a man and a woman.
- Co-chaired the Arizona Marriage Protection Amendment campaign in 2006.

### Immigration

"We need stronger enforcement on the border and at the workplace ..."

"As president, I will secure the border. ... Tight border security includes not just the entry and exit of people, but also the effective screening of cargo at our ports and other points of entry."

### Iraq

"Let me be clear: there is no military solution in Iraq, and there never was. The best way to protect our security and to pressure Iraq's leaders to resolve their civil war is to immediately begin to remove our combat troops. Not in six months or one year — now."

"I do not want to keep our troops in Iraq a minute longer than necessary to secure our interests there. Our goal is an Iraq that can stand on its own as a democratic ally and a responsible force for peace in its neighborhood. Our goal is an Iraq that no longer needs American troops."

### Terri Schiavo

"We had a situation surrounding Terri Schiavo ... that eventually allowed Congress to interject itself into that decision-making process of the families. It wasn't something I was comfortable with, but it was not something that I stood on the floor and stopped. And I think that was a mistake."

"It's an American tragedy and I hope that the next time we're presented with one of these situations we'll perhaps approach it in a more measured and reasoned fashion."

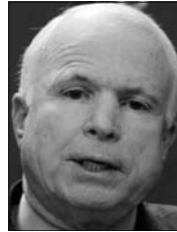

## Appunti del Parroco Associato: (From the Pastor's Notebook:)

### A Letter from Fr. Michael W. Magiera, F.S.S.P.

Dear Parishioners,

Though we all miss Monsignor Schaedel and wish him well during his time in the Eternal City, his absence gives me the opportunity, once again, to write to you. I fully enjoy every chance I get to write the bulletin letter. We remember that Monsignor's purpose in going to Rome was twofold: to attend the ordination of (by now) the Rev. Mr. Sean Danda to the transitional diaconate; and to attend the canonization of Sister St. Alphonsa whose home was Kerala, India.

The transitional diaconate is the last step before ordination to the priesthood. At this ordination, a man shares in the sacrament of Holy Orders and is considered to be in the "clerical" state. Many years ago, a man was considered a cleric when he received the "tonsure." What is Father Magiera talking about now? The tonsure is both a rite and a thing and, in "olden days" was conferred several times. The Catholic dictionary defines it as "a sacred rite instituted by the Church by which a baptized and confirmed Christian is received into the clerical order by the shearing of his hair and the investment with the surplice. The person thus tonsured becomes a partaker of the common privileges and obligations of the clerical state and is prepared for the reception of orders." The tonsure was retained and actually enlarged at the reception of each subsequent order. At the first tonsure, a small part of the crown of the head was shaved. Later, as the man received more orders, the shaved spot was made larger. Most of us, though we might not have realized it, have seen tonsured men: if not actual persons, then characters in movies — for example, Friar Tuck in the *Robin Hood* films or Brother Cadfael, brought to

life by Derek Jacoby in the medieval, monastic "who done it" series. It comes from the Latin *tondere*, to shear. I received the tonsure back in 1999. Today, apart from monastic religious, if it is done at all, it is more symbolic than anything else. A tiny bit of my hair was ceremoniously cut. It's virtually unnoticeable. Though my hair was never one of my crowning glories, at least I had it then and still have it. Imagine how puzzled a bishop must be when presented with a bald man on whom he is to confer the tonsure. Such things have happened! The Rev. Mr. Danda did not, I'm sure, receive the tonsure, but he is now a cleric and a deacon. We wish him well and look forward to his return.

I urged Monsignor to visit the personal parish church of the Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter while he's in Rome. You can see photos of this beautiful church, SS. Trinità dei Pellegrini, on the Fraternity's website, fssp.org. My society of apostolic life is 20 years old this year, on 18 October. I had hoped to go, but festivities were planned a bit too late for me to secure the services of a substitute. You know, I have still never been to Rome. I hope to go there one day before I get too old or too dead!

Many of you continue to ask about my mother. I'm so grateful for your concern and for your continued prayers for her. They're working and have been for quite a while now. Her care provider continues to come and help my mother with her daily shower, to take out the trash and the like. My mother continues to improve and is making remarkable progress. I told the 9:30 Mass goes last week, but I'll share it with the whole parish now: last Saturday evening my mother

attended a concert given by that "heartthrob" of senior citizen ladies everywhere, Engelbert Humperdinck. A few days ago, when I called her, she happened to be in a town a considerable distance from her home — no, she didn't drive — to install officers in an organization she's belonged to for a long time: the Eight and Forty of the American Legion Auxiliary.

I will be flying to the east coast this coming Thursday to spend five days with her. I haven't seen her since mid August, though I call her every day. The thought of waiting until Christmas to see her did not sit too well with me, so I decided to take this small break to visit her. This will cause a few changes in the Mass schedule this week: This Monday, due to Monsignor's absence, I will celebrate the noon as well as the 5:45 Mass. The Mass at noon this coming Friday will be celebrated by Monsignor in the Ordinary Form. There will be NO 5:45 EVENING MASS ON FRIDAY AND NO 9:00 MASS SATURDAY MORNING. Though I will not be here next Sunday, the 9:30 a.m. Mass will be celebrated as usual. My esteemed predecessor, Father Dennis Duvelius, will make a long-overdue visit to celebrate Mass in my stead. I'll return Monday, 20 October, in time for the 5:45 p.m. Mass. So, all in all, there's not much of a change. I know you all realize how important it is for me to visit my mother and I thank you for your understanding.

Last Sunday was Respect Life Sunday. I understand that the Cathedral last Sunday was jammed with people attending the Archbishop's special Mass. I trust that the Life Chain was also successful. I usually make it a point to attend both events. Last week, however, I had committed to celebrate Mass at St. Elizabeth Seton in Carmel. In my own way, I tried to make my stand for life from the pulpit last week. We must all line up on the side of life. Without life there is nothing else. Everything else must take a back seat to life. It's a fundamental, a first principle, if you will.

Monsignor made a good point in last week's

bulletin when he brought up the topic of Stewardship. I can't stress enough the importance of your participation in the United Catholic Appeal and, especially, the Legacy for Our Mission capital campaign. Just as the rain falls on the just and the unjust alike, those who did **NOT** do their part for the church renovation will be able to see the beautiful restoration just as those who sacrificed dearly for it will do. Ah, but will they be able to see that wonderful result with the same wondering and grateful eyes? I hope that there will be **no one** who did nothing for our dear church's restoration. It will never be too late. If you haven't made a pledge or paid the pledge you made, I beg you to do either/or — and soon.

The Church celebrates the feasts of some great and "heavy-hitting" saints this week: St. Edward the Confessor, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, St. Ignatius of Antioch and St. Luke. When we honor the saints, we honor God, Whose saints they are. The Church is rich in many things: Her history, accomplishments, art, etc. But what make the Church truly rich are Her four marks: One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic. The most important mark is the one called Holy. That's why the Church exists — to make us holy. That holiness is personified in the millions of saints in the Church Triumphant.

On a more earthly level, the process of picture taking for the pictorial directory went quite well. I understand that we had to add two days for the photo sessions, 22 and 23 October. I had my photo taken last week. I was somewhat puzzled when the photographer told me he had to devote a half-page to my photo. Strange. I was wearing my black cassock. Isn't black supposed to be "slimming"?

I hope you've enjoyed reading this letter as much as I have had writing it. God bless you, my children and my friends.
