Appunti del Parroco: (From the Pastor's Notebook:)

A Letter from Msgr. Joseph F. Schaedel, V.G.

Dear Parishioners,

This week, we observe one of my favorite feast days: the **Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes**. Of all the Shrines I've visited, in this country and in Europe, Lourdes is my very favorite.

Recall the story: Beginning on Feb. 11, 1858, a lady appeared to a poor peasant girl, Saint Bernadette Soubirous. The lady would later identify herself as "the Immaculate Conception," a.k.a. the Blessed Virgin Mary. A miraculous healing spring of water appeared there; the little town of Lourdes, tucked in the Southwest corner of France — almost into Spain — has been a place of healing and pilgrimage every since.

I recall the candlelight rosary processions seven nights a week. About eight to ten thousand participate each evening! Several years ago, when I spent a week there with the Knights and Dames of Malta, nearly 60,000 participated in the weekly Sunday procession with the Blessed Sacrament. It was as if the entire crowd from a Colts game in the former RCA Dome were on the knees adoring Our Lord's True Presence.

Anyhow, this Wednesday, Feb. 11, is the **Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes**. It is also appropriately the **World Day of the Sick**. All Catholics are encouraged to pray for those who are seriously ill.

Above I mentioned the Knights and Dames of Malta. It is hard to explain fully in this limited space what this organization really is. To simplify things: The Knights and Dames of Malta is a "lay religious order" for people who wish to join. The vast majority of the worldwide membership are married persons with families, regular jobs, etc. They have a particular regimen of spiritually plus a commitment to do what they can to help the poor, the sick and the marginalized.

I am the chaplain for the local group of Knights and Dames of Malta. For that reason we will have the annual celebration of the World Day for the Sick and Our Lady of Lourdes here at Holy Rosary this Wednesday evening at 5:45 p.m.

Mass will be celebrated in the Ordinary Form. During Mass anyone present may receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. I say "anyone present," but let me qualify that. I actually mean that anyone is invited and encouraged to attend the Mass. The Knights and Dames from around the city will be there as well. After the homily, I will offer the Anointing of the Sick.

We used to term the **Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick** "Extreme Unction." However, that mistakenly came to mean anointing for healing in "extreme" or "hopeless" cases. In other words, one could

expect to receive Extreme Unction only on his or her deathbed.

Imagine how one would feel seeing the priest come at them! You certainly would have the impression that you had little time before you would "kick the bucket." (In fact, that's where that term "kick the bucket" comes from. While breathing one's last breaths, one might kick the holy water bucket at the end of the bed.)

Of course, it's fine to continue to call this sacrament "Extreme Unction" as long as we keep in mind that it is not reserved only for the dying. The better term for that is "the last rights" or *Viaticum* (food — Holy Communion — "for the journey.")

Canon Law simply states that the Anointing of the Sick can be administered to a member of the Faithful (a Catholic) who, "after having reached the use of reason, begins to be in danger due to sickness or old age. This sacrament can be repeated whenever the sick person again falls into a serious sickness."

I supposed that once we are born we are "in danger." There's an old saying, "Once we begin to live, we begin to die." Think about it; it's true. We cannot administer this sacrament to very young children as they have not reached "the use of reason." (Unfortunately, that is also true for some adults!) And allowing anyone and everyone to receive the Sacrament would be an abuse.

I could go on and on, but you get the picture. We will have a Mass Wednesday, Feb. 11, at 5:45 p.m. to celebrate the **Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes** and **World Day for the Sick**. During Mass, those who are elderly, have chronic illness or a lingering serious illness may come forward to receive the Anointing of the Sick.

The priest calls down the Holy Spirit by placing his hands over the person's head. Then the persons are anointed with the Oil of the Sick on their forehead and on both hands.

As always, this Mass will be preceded by a chance for confession at 5:15 p.m. This is the greatest healing of all! In any case, everyone is invited to the Mass Wednesday. We welcome the Knights and Dames of Malta in a special way.

As we speak of death and dying, let me recommend to you the article on Page 20 of this week's *Criterion*. It outlines the moral debate about so-called "brain death." This has implications for all of us as we care for our loved ones who are dying. It also has huge implications for organ donation. Read the article; it's on the back page of this week's issue of *The Criterion*.

Speaking of serious illness, John Oechsle lost his long and valiant battle with cancer last week. His Mass of Christian Burial was here on Friday morning. We extend our sympathy to Marie Pittman-Oechsle and the entire family. John fought hard with his customary positive attitude and sharp sense of humor until the very end. May John's soul and all the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace!

All I can tell you is that there is one thing of which I am convinced; of one thing of which I am certain: Providence never fails!
