Rules for fasting and abstinence during Lent

Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday also are days of fasting. Here are the rules governing these obligations:

Abstinence: In the United States, all who have reached their 14th birthday are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting: On the days of fast, only one full meal may be taken. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken but together may not add up to a second full meal. The obligation to fast binds all between their 18th and 59th years.

A Letter from Msgr. Joseph F. Schaedel, V.G.

Dear Parishioners,

Lent begins this Wednesday, **Ash Wednesday**. We will have four Masses on Ash Wednesday. The schedule is listed on Page 2 of this bulletin. Ashes will be distributed during each Mass.

Lent has three particular facets: **Almsgiving, prayer and penance**.

Almsgiving is very simply giving our financial sacrifices to those who are in need. We don't just give money to charity out of our excess; we give in a way that makes us notice. We give up something we might have purchased for ourselves in order to give money to those who are in need.

As always, we want to help. There will be a second collection every weekend during Lent. Yes, economically times are tough. But if they are hard for us, imagine how difficult these economic conditions are for others who were far worse off than we ever were to begin with! In fact, statistics show that charitable giving often increases in rough times like these.

Next weekend it will be **almsgiving** for the **Black and Indian Missions** in the U.S. For various reasons, the Catholic Church in the U.S. has done a miserable job of evangelizing among Native American and African-American peoples. We need to do better. This second collection will help.

(By the way, our **almsgiving** the following weekend, March 7-8, will be to aid the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. The collection envelopes you received in the mail were marked with an incorrect date. The envelopes indicated Feb. 15. That's wrong — it's March 7. If you turned in your incorrectly dated envelope last weekend, no problem. We make sure your contribution is included in the collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe on March 7.)

Prayer is essential for the observance of **Lent**. Listed elsewhere in the bulletin is the schedule of additional Masses and services for **Lent**. We will have two Masses every single day, at least two opportunities for confession, and the **Way of the Cross** after both Masses every Friday.

Try to attend some extra Masses on weekdays during Lent. In addition to what we offer here in the parish, don't forget time for personal prayer: Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Wednesday afternoons, nocturnal Adoration on First Friday, the rosary, reading the Bible, devotional prayers.

People ask me from time to time what I do during Lent. I suspect they think I don't do anything. Well, this year for one thing, I've decided to do something suggested to me by Edward Cardinal Eagan of New York. Cardinal Eagan said that when he was a seminarian, his spiritual director told him to read from the New Testament for five minutes every day during Advent and Lent. Then meditate on what-

ever he had read for ten minutes. Sounds like a plan.

Penance is also essential during Lent. And not just during Lent either. As noted on Page 7 of the bulletin, we fast (don't eat between meals) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. We abstain from meat on all Fridays during Lent. But people think that since abstaining from meat on every single Friday of the year is no longer required, then penance is not required either.

Wrong! Canon (Church) Law No. 1249 says: "*All members of the Christian faithful in their own way are bound to do penance in virtue of Divine Law in order that all may be joined in a common observance of penance...*" Canon No. 1250 goes on to say, *All Fridays through the year and the time of Lent are penitential days and times throughout the Universal Church.*"

The bottom line is that every Friday is a day when all Catholics are bound to do some sort of penitential act. It is no longer required (except during Lent) that this penance be abstaining from meat. We are to choose a penance for ourselves every Friday and every day during Lent.

I strongly recommend attending our annual adult education series for Lent, **Spaghetti & Spirituality**. It begins Wednesday, March 4. The schedule is elsewhere on Page 6 of this bulletin and on the fliers in back of church. There is a sign-up sheet in the vestibule. Please sign up if you are coming; it helps us plan. By the way, we could use some more volunteers to help. Please call the parish office.

There is a wonderful article on Page 7 of this week's *Criterion* about **Spaghetti & Spirituality**. Never in my wildest dreams did I ever think this adult education series could ever attract such marvelous speakers or become so

popular. Thanks to parishioner Bruce Konicek and his helpers, it has grown into what it is today! Our biggest worry now is how to handle the crowds. Providence has not failed us!

Today (Sunday) is the **Rite of Election** for candidates (already baptized) and catechumens (not yet baptized) at SS. Peter & Paul Cathedral. The archbishop formally welcomes each of them into formal serious preparation to become Catholics. As we progress through Lent, there will be some brief rites at the Masses in the Ordinary Form to help spiritually prepare each one from Holy Rosary. Our catechumens from Holy Rosary are Megan Kelly and David Brinkley; our candidates are Kim Handwerk, Jodie Gassert, Kelly Nicholson and Ruth Mattingly. Please keep them in your prayers.

Informed Catholics Know: The Nazi Holocaust really happened; it is one of the saddest chapters ever written in history. Anyone who would deny the reality of it is "not playing with a full deck." One major crackpot has been in the news lately. Six million Jewish people were cruelly murdered. But unfortunately, there were many more exterminated. Just one example is the over a thousand Catholic bishops, priests, and seminarians were killed in Nazi concentration camps.

Lent is almost here; make the most of it to draw close to Christ. He is the conqueror of sin and death. And, if you fail in your resolve, start over. Don't give up!

Of one thing I am convinced; of one thing I am certain: Providence never fails!
