If you are unfamiliar with the Greek or Latin for the *Sanctus* (Holy, Holy) and the *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God), the Latin Mass parts are printed in the missalette on pages 196-201.

Appunti del Parroco: (From the Pastor's Notebook:)

A Letter from Msgr. Joseph F. Schaedel, V.G.

Dear Parishioners,

I think most of you know that Father Magiera lost his mother on Tuesday. Mrs. Magiera had been ill and in and out of the hospital for the past year. Our sympathy and prayers go out to Father Magiera, to his sister, her family and all of the extended Magiera Family.

The Solemn High Requiem Funeral Mass will be Monday, March 9, at 10 a.m. at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church in Doylestown, Pa. Mortuary calling is the night before (Sunday) at McGhee Funeral Home in Southampton, Pa.

In a message to many of us, Father Magiera wrote this about his mother: *"She was, indeed, a very special woman. Right now, I'm all out of kilter because there is a void where she once was. Sometimes, I'm tempted to think that I'll never be able to recover from this. Yet, I know, as those of you who have lost a parent or parents know, that God gets us through this. I know He won't fail me...."*

Father is right. I know; so do many of you. Three of the five priests in our rectory have lost our mothers in the past year. I lost my mother last April 24; Father James Bonke, who works in the Marriage Tribunal at the Catholic Center, lost his dear mother just prior to that. Of course our lives will never be quite the same. Nor should they be. But we do recover. As Father Magiera says in his remarks above, Providence does not fail us. The problem is that Providence does not always do things our way!

I had the privilege of knowing Mrs. Magiera as did some of you. She was a very special woman. And her son, Michael, was a good son. He wore himself out making sure that she was cared for properly until the very end. I will say that none of the three of us in the house who lost our mothers this past year should have any regrets; we did our best.

If you still have your parents, think about that. "Honor thy father and thy mother." Of course we miss them. May all who've lost a parent find consolation in our Catholic Faith and in the knowledge that we were good sons (and daughters).

Speaking of death, we buried a wonderful lady on Friday, Paula Corritore Kalinowski. Paula suffered greatly for several years. On Monday, God called her from this life. Paula and her husband, Ed, were faithful parishioners. Many times, I'd observe Paula (only in her early 60s) trudging back and forth to Mass with her walker, in constant pain. What an example she was.

Our sympathy goes out to Ed, to their children, and to all the extended family. Paula was originally from Massachusetts. Her Mass of Christian Burial was here on Friday. She is buried in Massachusetts. May Paula's soul, Dorothy Magiera's soul and all the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace!

Our annual Lenten adult education series, *Spaghetti & Spirituality*, got off to a rousing start Wednesday night. Our speaker, Terek Saab, did a marvelous job. We had a full house

for Priori Hall indeed. About 100 more people showed up than had RSVP'd! Please call ahead to let us know you are coming or register online at our parish Web site: www.holyrosaryindy.org.

This Wednesday our speaker is Father Tadeusz Pacholczyk, Ph.D. "Father Tad" is the director of education for the National Catholic Bioethics Center. He has a knack for being able to put some very, very complicated medical-moral-ethical issues into words that we all can understand. Check out the *Spaghetti & Spirituality* schedule elsewhere in this bulletin.

Last week, I made it clear (perhaps too painfully clear) that *Spaghetti & Spirituality* is an adult education series. It is for high school age and above. As the flier promoting the series says, "Out of respect for all who come, we ask that no one bring any younger children."

Naturally, this refers to the fact that some very young children can be disruptive or noisy at Mass or at a lecture. As you all know, my theory is that noisy children in church or at a lecture are like New Year's resolutions: they should be carried out!

But there is another, perhaps even more important reason. Last Wednesday's presentation by Terek Saab is a good example. From time to time, speakers would like to clearly and directly talk about very sensitive issues. I, too, would like to clearly and directly preach on some sensitive issues at Mass (*e.g.* misuse of the Internet, issues about sexuality and marriage).

However, from time to time, our speakers are forced to alter their presentations out of respect for children present. This should not be the case. When, where and how will adult Catholics hear presentations on Catholic teaching about sensitive issues that would only confuse younger children? For the most part, we can't

really do this from the pulpit at Sunday Mass. I am not about to restrict Mass to adults. But I do think it is wise to restrict adult education to adults. Think about it.

Next Monday, March 16, we begin our *Quaranta Ore di Adorazione Eucaristica* or Forty Hours Devotion. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will begin after the Monday evening Mass and continue during the day and night through Wednesday.

There is a sign-up sheet in the vestibule for you to sign-up for an hour of adoration. Each hour must be filled. Sign up for an hour of adoration during the day for Forty Hours Monday through Wednesday. What a perfect practice for Lent! Make a real sacrifice: come in the middle of the night!

There will be the usual schedule of Masses and confessions during this time. Each evening at 6:30 p.m. we will have a special service (not a Mass) consisting of Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, special prayers and a sermon. Our retreat master and speaker for this devotion is Father James Jackson, F.S.S.P. He is an excellent speaker. Plan to attend.

On the final night of Forty Hours, we have the service and sermon as usual at 6:30 p.m. (after a Solemn High Mass in the Extraordinary Form which begins at 5:15 p.m.) Our grand celebration is the spaghetti dinner in Priori Hall following the service. We will have already had our spirituality that evening.

March is the month of **Saint Joseph**. Next Sunday, the Italian tradition of **Saint Joseph's Table** continues here at *la Chiesa del Santo Rosario*.

Lumen Christi School (a private Catholic elementary and high school located here at Holy Rosary) helps us keep the tradition going. The delicious Italian food (thanks to the marvelous
