Pope Benedict XVI becomes 7th-oldest pontiff since 1400

Last Monday marked the 30,410th day of Pope Benedict XVI's life. This made him the seventh oldest pope since 1400 when such records became reliable.

The blog site, *Popes and Papacy* by Anura Guruge, reported that Benedict XVI, 83, has leaped from 10th to seventh on the list in just the span of three months. He passed Benedict XIV, Paul IV and Gregory XIII, all of whom were also 83 but died days younger than Benedict XVI now is.

Next highest on the list is Benedict XVI's predecessor, John Paul II, who was 84 (31,000 days) when he died April 2, 2005. Benedict XVI would exceed his mentor's age on Feb. 29, 2012.

Here are the longest-living popes according to Guruge:

1. Leo XIII, reigned 1878-1903, age 93
2. Clement XII, 1730-1740, age 87
3. Clement X, 1670-1676, age 86
4. Pius IX, 1846-1878, age 85 (31,315 days)
5. Innocent XII, 1691-1700, age 85 (31,244 days)
6. John Paul II, 1978-2005, age 84 (31,000)
7. Benedict XVI, 2005-current, age 83 (30,416 days as of today)
8. Gregory XIII, 1572-1585, age 83 (30,409 days)
9. Paul IV, 1555-1559, age 83 (30,366 days)
10. Benedict XIV, 1740-1758, age 83 (30,348 days)
11. Pius XII, 1939-1958, age 82

Bulletin ran misleading info about state's Catholic reps

Contrary to an article in the June 27 Holy Rosary Parish bulletin, none of Indiana's Catholic U.S. representatives have voted in complete accord with Church teachings on vital legislation.

The article, citing a report from the Catholic Advocate, claimed that Rep. Joe Donnelly (D-2nd District) and Rep. Brad Ellsworth (D-8th District) always voted in agreement with the Catholic position. We have since learned from multiple sources that this is false. Both congressmen have voted in favor of health-care legislation which contains provisions opposed to Catholic teaching.

We apologize for publishing this misleading, inaccurate report.

The June 27 article did correctly report that the state's only other Catholic U.S. representative, Pete Visclosky (D-1st District), voted in direct opposition to the Catholic position on vital legislation.

Appunti del Parroco: (From the Pastor's Notebook:)

A Letter from Msgr. Joseph F. Schaedel, V.G.

Dear Parishioners,

As difficult as it is to believe, here we are on the last full weekend of July. Next Sunday will take us into the month of August — a month of beautiful feast days of Our Lady and some of the great saints.

After this weekend we will also bid “farewell” to our July guest, Father Mark Drew. It seems like yesterday that Father Drew arrived. As you know, Father Drew is from England. You can tell by his delightful accent. He is a priest of the Diocese of Sens and Auxerre in Burgundy, France. He is studying in Greece working on a doctorate in Medieval Byzantine Theology.

Father attended a conference at Fordham University in New York, and then came to be with us for the month of July. He has been a great help to Father Magiera and me. He has been a pleasant companion in the rectory and is a great cook! We wish him save travel as he returns to Greece and hope he will consider coming back soon.

This weekend Father Magiera begins his annual summer vacation. While he is away we will welcome Father Scott Haynes, S.J.C., from Saint John Cantius Church in Chicago. Father Scott has been with us many times before. Welcome back, Father Scott!

From time to time, people hand me things suggesting that I mention them in this letter or

print them in the bulletin. Often they are articles warning about how some so-called Catholic politicians vote. Others claim to be lists of companies or organizations that give money to various causes that are in direct opposition to the Catholic moral teaching. Still others purport to be scandalous revelations of the words or behavior of some priest or bishop. (Old news, if you ask me.)

To be honest, I shy away from these materials. The main reason is that I have no idea what the primary source for them is. I have neither the time nor the energy to delve into research to prove or disprove what they allege.

A few weeks ago, I gave to our bulletin editor a list of the voting records of the members of Congress, which included, of course, Catholic members of Congress. I was familiar with the source, so I trusted it would be accurate. We printed some of the information in this parish bulletin at the end of last month. This week we discovered the information we printed is not accurate.

And so, folks, this is why I don't repeat or print everything everyone hands to me. Now I have been the source of inaccurate information about how so-called Catholic politicians voted on critical life issues. In this case, it was the recent horrible healthcare bill. No more — I hope I have learned my lesson.

The problem these days is that anyone can

print anything and then present it as “Gospel Truth.” It's always been that way. Over the years, people have always mentioned to me some stupid thing they have read about the Catholic Church or Church teaching. When I ask them the source, the response generally is, “Oh, I read it in a book.”

So? Just because one has the resources to print a book, does that mean they have a corner on truth or accuracy? Start with the *Satanic Bible*!

Now, the problem is worse than ever. Someone tells me what he or she read. It's basically inaccurate, misleading or downright stupid. I ask the source. “Oh, I saw it on the Internet!” Geezzz! Now the Internet is the infallible source of information about religion or anything else?

There are so many religious crackpots on the Internet; we could amuse ourselves all day every day without a repeat visit to any of their sites. In fact, some people have almost a full-time hobby in forwarding these stupid things to other people.

Even if they are true, most of them still amount to the sin of detraction. So, some misguided Jesuit takes crucifixes down at one of their universities. So, some nun gives her misguided opinion on pro-choice issues. What do you want me to do about it? What can most of us do about it?

Christ and His Holy Church have always had traitors since Day One, beginning with Judas Iscariot. I have enough trouble keeping up with what goes on at Holy Rosary and in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis! Get a life.

Now, at the same time, let me also say that the

Here we are lucky to have **Catholic Radio Indianapolis, 89.1 F.M.** Their special patron is Saint Maximilian Kolbe. I will be celebrating their annual Mass in his honor here at Holy Rosary on Friday, Aug. 13, at noon. All are invited to the Mass.

Following the Mass there will be the annual luncheon for members of the **Max-1000 Program**. What is **Max-1000**? It's a group of people who pledge to contribute at least \$25 per month to support Catholic Radio Indianapolis. (We are looking for 1,000 people to do this in honor of Saint Maximilian Kolbe — hence, **Max-1000**.)
